ANNUAL DOG CONTROL REPORT 2022-23



Report on the administration of Gore District Council's Policy and Practices in relation to the control of dogs for the year 1 July 2022 to 30 June 2023.

Dog control in the Gore District

The total number of registered dogs in the Gore District as at 30 June 2023 was 3315. Approximately one third of these dogs are pets domiciled in the urban areas of the Gore District.

The Council employs one full-time officer and three part-time after-hours officers. The full-time officer works Monday to Friday and is on call for night shift and weekend, once every nine weeks. One part-time officer is on call on a two week on, one week off roster system, with the other weeks being picked up by the remaining officers on a nine-weekly cycle.

Dog control enforcement practices

During the year under review, the Council received 22 formal safety related complaints in regard to the behaviour of dogs. Of the complaints received, eight concerned dog attacks on people and 14 on animals. All the complaints were the subject of an investigation and action to address the concerns of the complainants was implemented.

The Council is still finding some dogs are not being claimed by their owners, after being impounded. This appears to be due to the cost of registering/microchipping the dogs and the cost of impounding fees which are required to be paid by the Council in full before the dogs can be released. These dogs are rehomed if they are of suitable temperament usually through Furever Homes in Invercargill or in some cases to private individuals, after checks are carried out on them and their property. Otherwise, they are taken to the vet to be euthanaised.

During the year, a total of 72 infringement notices were issued. Council representatives contacted dog owners via phone, text or visited dog owners in the area reminding them to register their dogs after reminder notices for non-registration were issued. Unfortunately, some dog owners did not heed the warnings given, forcing the Council to issue infringement notices for non-registration. The Council offers a payment plan to dog owners struggling to make payment in full and people seem to be taking advantage of this.

The Council takes a vigilant approach regarding non-registration of dogs. Dog owners who fail to register their dogs may be subject to prosecution under the Dog Control Act. Efforts by the Council to encourage owners to register their dogs, include text, letter or personal visit and the issue of an infringement notice prior to proceedings being instituted.

Dog education

The Council's Animal Management team continue to provide owners with information on how to prevent dogs barking incessantly and also offers advice on how to keep dogs from wandering. The Council's Animal Management team undertake regular patrols of the parks in Gore and Mataura educating dog owners on their responsibility when exercising their dogs in these areas.

The Council's staff put a concerted effort into clamping down on unregistered dogs in the District. Patrols are carried out in Gore and Mataura which appears to have made a positive difference with wandering dogs in the area.

Menacing and dangerous dogs

In the year under review, three dogs in the Gore district were classified by the Council. Two were classified as menacing after complaints were received regarding dog attacks and aggressive behaviour and one classified as menacing due to breed.

There are currently six dogs in the district classified as menacing (by breed) under Section 33C of the Dog Control Act 1996 and a further six (by behaviour) under Section 33A. There are three dogs classified as dangerous under Section 31(1)(b).

ANNUAL DOG CONTROL REPORT 2023/24



Report on the administration of the Gore District Council's policy and practices in relation to the control of dogs for the year 1 July 2023 to 30 June 2024.

Dog control in the Gore District

The total number of registered dogs in the Gore District as at 30 June 2024 was 3,401. Approximately one-third of these dogs are pets domiciled in the urban areas of the Gore District.

The Council employs five part-time animal services officers. Two of these officers work Monday to Friday, while the remaining three provide after-hours and weekend cover on a roster system.

Dog control enforcement practices

During the year under review, the Council received 20 formal safety-related complaints regarding the behaviour of dogs. Of the complaints received, seven involved dog attacks on people and 13 involved attacks on animals. All complaints were investigated and appropriate actions were taken to address the concerns of the complainants.

The Council continues to encounter instances where dogs are not claimed by their owners after being impounded. This appears to be due to the cost associated with registering/microchipping the dogs and paying impounding fees, which must be settled in full before the dogs can be released. These dogs are rehomed if they are of suitable temperament, usually through Furever Homes in Invercargill or, in some cases, to private individuals after appropriate checks are conducted on them and their properties. If rehoming is not an option, they are taken to a veterinarian to be euthanised.

Over the course of the year, a total of 127 infringement notices were issued. Council representatives contacted dog owners via phone, text, or in person to remind them to register their dogs after reminder notices for non-registration were issued. Unfortunately, some dog owners did not heed the warnings given, forcing the Council to issue infringement notices for non-registration. The Council offers a payment plan to dog owners struggling to make payment in full and is utilized by several dog owners.

The Council takes a vigilant approach to the non-registration of dogs. Dog owners who fail to register their dogs may be subject to prosecution under the Dog Control Act. The Council's efforts to encourage owners to register their dogs include sending texts, letters or making personal visits, as well as issuing infringement notices before initiating legal proceedings.

Dog education

The Council's Animal Services team continues to provide owners with information on how to prevent incessant barking and offers advice on how to keep dogs from wandering. The team also conduct regular patrols of parks in Gore and Mataura, educating dog owners about their responsibilities when exercising their dogs in these areas.

The Council's staff have made a concerted effort to clamp down on unregistered dogs in the District. Patrols in Gore and Mataura appear to have positively impacted on wandering dogs in the area.

Menacing and dangerous dogs

In the year under review, three dogs in the Gore District were classified by the Council. Two were classified as menacing following complaints of dog attacks and aggressive behaviour, while one was classified as menacing due to its breed.

There are currently five dogs in the District classified as menacing (by breed) under Section 33C of the Dog Control Act 1996, and a further six (by behaviour) under Section 33A. Additionally, three dogs are classified as dangerous under Section 31(1)(b), and there are two probationary dog owners under Section 21(2).

Dog Owner's Obligations

All dog owners with dogs ordinarily kept in the Gore District must register their dogs with the Gore District Council. On completing the form, a dog owner may post the form together with the appropriate fees payable, to the Gore District Council at PO Box 8, Gore 9740 or deliver these items to the Council at 29Bowler Ave, Gore.

It is an offence, when applying for the registration of a dog, to make a statement knowing that statement to be false. On conviction, a court may impose a fine of up to \$3,000.

All dogs over the age of 3 months must be registered. It is an offence to keep a dog older than 3 months which is unregistered. On conviction, a court may impose a fine of up to \$3,000.

If the current disc has been lost or stolen replacement discs and collars may be obtained from the Gore District Council. Any dog not wearing a collar having a current registration label or disc attached will, until the contrary is proved, be treated as unregistered.

On change of ownership of any registered dog, both the previous owner and the new owner must, within 14 days, give written notice to the Gore District Council, of the change of ownership and the residential address of the new owner and the address at which the dog will be kept. It is an offence not to comply with this requirement. On conviction, a court may impose a fine of up to \$500.

If the owners address is changed within the district, the owner must, within 14 days, give written notice of the change to the Gore District Council. If any dog is transferred to and kept within the district of another territorial authority other than the one in which it has been kept for 1 month or more the owner must, within 6 weeks of the transfer, give written notice of transfer to both territorial authorities, setting out the address at which the dog will be kept. It is an offence not to comply with this requirement. On conviction, a court may impose a fine of up to \$500.

If the fee for the registration of a dog is paid and that dog dies, a refund will be made on request as follows:

- Where a dog dies before the commencement of the year, the full fee will be refunded:
- Where the dog dies during the year, 1/12th of the annual fee for each complete month remaining in the registration year after the date of application for a refund will be refunded.

If any dog is first required to be registered after 1 August in any registration year, the fee shall be 1/12th of the annual fee for each complete month remaining in the registration year after the date of such a registration.

The registration fees include goods and services tax.

Owners wishing to claim a reduced fee for neutered dogs must produce a certificate from a registered veterinarian certifying that the dog has been neutered. If any dog over the age of 3 months is found not wearing a collar with a current registration label or disc attached, on land or premises other than its owners land or premises, or in any public place, the dog may be seized and impounded.

Control of dogs

Sections 52, 53 and 54A, Dog Control Act 1996

The owner of a dog must keep the dog under control at all times and, when in a public place with the dog, must use a leash at all times. A dog will be treated as not being under control...

- If it is found at large on any land or premises other than a public place or a private way without the consent (express or implied) of the occupier or person in charge of the land or the premises; or
- If it is found at large in any public place or in any private way in contravention of any regulations or bylaw.
- You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with this provision.

Section 54, Dog Control Act 1996

The owner of a dog must... Ensure that the dog receives proper care and attention and is supplied with proper and sufficient food water, and shelter; and Ensure that the dog receives adeouate exercise.

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to imprisonment for up to 3 months or to a fine not exceeding \$5,000 if you fail to comply with this provision.

Obligations of dog owner's property Section 52A, Dog Control Act 1996

Section 52A, Dog Control Act 1996

The owner of a dog must ensure, when the dog is on land or premises occupied by the owner,-

- That the dog is under direct control of a person; or
- That the dog is confined within the land or premises in such a way that it cannot freely leave the land or promises.

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine of \$3,000 if you fail to comply with this provision. In addition, a dog control officer or dog ranger may seize and impound the dog.

Note - Failure to supply any of the information requested in this form that is relevant to your application may prevent the registration of your dog. You are encouraged to request the Gore District Council to correct or amend any of these details if you discover a mistake or if the relevant circumstances change.

Privacy Act 1993

You are required to provide the information requested under the Dog Control Act 1996. It will be used for the purposes of administrating Council's obligations under that Act and will not be disclosed other than for the purposes specified in that Act. You have the right to access and request the correction of any personal information held about you
